We are still taking bookings for baptisms in December hoping that they will be able to go ahead when current restrictions are lifted.

I try to remember that the difficulty we are going through is for a good purpose. We are trying to protect the most vulnerable in our communities from what might be a very serious illness for them. Even though we are unable to gather for prayer our faith shows itself in how we look after each other and in what we can do to support those who are struggling.

If anyone would like to volunteer as a steward so that we can open our churches for private prayer please ring me or e-mail with your contact details over the next few days. New volunteer stewards are very welcome. When we are able to make a rota for our stewards and open for private prayer we will display the times here.

Let's continue to keep each other in our prayers.

We pray for our health workers and for all who are sick.

We pray for the scientists who are working for a cure and a vaccine to end the pandemic.

We ask God to bless the work of those caring for the poor and disadvantaged in our communities and across the world.

We pray for all who are struggling with isolation and separation from those they love.

We pray for all the staff and families connected to our parish schools.

I've included in this newsletter the readings for Mass this weekend. I know that many of us would, under normal circumstances, be attending a Remembrance Day service this weekend. We have been asked to make our act of remembrance at home so I've included some extracts from a Remembrance Day service here that you might like to use.

# A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Thessalonians

We want you to be quite certain, brothers, about those who have died, to make sure that you do not grieve about them, like the other people who have no hope. We believe that Jesus died and rose again, and that it will be the same for those who have died in Jesus: God will bring them with him. We can tell you this from the Lord's own teaching, that any of us who are left alive until the Lord's coming will not have any advantage over those who have died. At the trumpet of God, the voice of the archangel will call out the command and the Lord himself will come down from heaven; those who have died in Christ will be the first to rise, and then those of us who are still alive will be taken up in the clouds, together with them; to meet the Lord in the air. So we shall stay with the Lord for ever. With such thoughts as these you should comfort one another.

#### Gospel: Matthew 25:1-13

Five of them were foolish and five were sensible: the foolish ones did take their lamps, but they brought no oil, whereas the sensible ones took flasks of oil as well as their lamps. The bridegroom was late, and they all grew drowsy and fell asleep. But at midnight there was a cry, "The bridegroom is here! Go out and meet him." At this, all those bridesmaids woke up and trimmed their lamps, and the foolish ones said to the sensible ones, "Give us some of your oil: our lamps are going out." But they replied, "There may not be enough for us and for you; you had better go to those who sell it and buy some for yourselves." They had gone off to buy it when the bridegroom arrived. Those who were ready went in with him to the wedding hall and the door was closed. The other bridesmaids arrived later. "Lord, Lord," they said "open the door for us." But he replied, "I tell you solemnly, I do not know you." So stay awake, because you do not know either the day or the hour.'

Isaiah 40.31


Those who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary they shall walk and not faint.
